
## **ALBERTA ELKS NEWSLETTER** November 2023

# **Foundation News**

### What is a Disaster Victim Assistance Grant?

Upon knowledge of a disaster to a family (for example, a fire to the their principal residence if burnt or destroyed), a Lodge can contact the Alberta Elks Foundation Secretary either by phone (780-504-7605) or email (albertaelksfoundation@gmail.com) to request financial help for the family.

Each household will be allowed one grant of \$500. Lodges are encouraged to contribute at least an equal amount if at all possible.

Any further assistance will need to be applied for as a Personal Assistance grant application found on the Alberta Elks Association website.

Financial assistance will be made available upon the receipt of the phone call / request. Once contact has been made with the Foundation Office, a cheque payable to the family involved will be prepared and immediately mailed to the Lodge for presentation to the family.

At the first Lodge meeting following the request for the grant, a motion will be passed by the Lodge authorizing the application for assistance. A copy of the minutes is to be forwarded as soon as possible to the Foundation Office along with the application form found on the Alberta Elks Association website. The financial assistance will be recorded as a grant from the Foundation.

Note that natural disasters, affecting a large area and population will not be eligible.

The application for Disaster Victim Assistance shall only be made by Lodges within the jurisdiction of the Alberta Elks Association.

In a world where emergencies can strike at any moment, the Alberta Elks Foundation is here to help. The Mighty Lil' Elk Program (MLE) took flight in February 2023 and has provided hospital survival bags to families in three Alberta Regional Hospitals: Medicine Hat, Red Deer, and Grand Prairie. The initiative was met with resounding success and helped 53 families within the first three months. The program was designed to ease the burden of families in emergency situations by providing them with hygiene products like shampoo, conditioner, toothbrush, toothpaste, and much more. Also included in the bag is a universal phone charger to keep them connected with their loved ones during their time of need.

Now, the MLE program is expanding its wings further and will be offering our services to Lethbridge Regional Hospital, Peace River Health Centre, and Fort McMurray Health Centre. The program is also opening up to lodges, providing them with the opportunity to purchase MLE bags through the Foundation to distribute to their local hospitals. The ordering lodge will be responsible for the cost of the bag as well as shipping if it is required. A fillable order form and letter will be sent to your lodge secretary's in the near future.

Please note, in the interest of complying with AGLC spending specifications, Mighty Lil' Elk bag purchases need to be from the lodge's general account.

Let's work together to make a difference in the lives of families in need.

Sundre Elks Lodge No. 338





With tickets for the fourth annual Marathon Bingo sold out in advance, organizers' expectations seem to have been exceeded.

"We ended up with 71 players," said Michelle Engelman, Sundre Elks Lodge No. 338's Exalted Ruler.

"We were hoping for 70," she said, adding the turnout might yet have been even higher had it not been for a few who at the last moment ended up being unable to make it out.

Located on First Avenue SW across the road from the Sundre & District Museum, the local Elks hall was a busy place on Saturday, Sept. 30, with the marathon running all day from 1-8:30 p.m., although doors had opened that morning.

After expenses, about \$2,000 was raised for the Sundre Community Van Society, said Engelman.

Asked where proceeds have previously been allocated, she said the Elks implemented a new system this past January and explained that other community service groups have the option to approach the Elks to provide a helping hand every Tuesday for three months in exchange for a contribution.

This past year, she said the Elks donated about \$2,300 to the Sundre Nutrition for Learning Society, a little more than \$3,000 for the Chinook Arch Victim's Services Society, as well as approximately \$2,400 for the Grade 8 sailing group.

"We've really upped our game," she said.

From a local perspective, she said the Elks are focused mainly on identifying and helping to address the needs of children in the community, while also endeavouring to cater to the needs of seniors.

The Marathon Bingo came on the heels of a golf tournament fundraiser that was held on Aug. 20 at the Forest Heights Golf & RV Resort. That charity event brought in about \$3,500, which ended up being disbursed among half dozen groups in roughly \$500 sums, she said.

"Our biggest goal is to just do what we can to give back to the community," she said.

"That's my favourite part of this. We put a lot of work into it, and to be able to give back is such a great feeling," she said, adding that being able to help other community groups makes the effort worthwhile.

Praising the helping hands of all ages who volunteer to ensure such events go off without a hitch, she invited anyone who might be interested in learning more about the Elks to consider dropping by the hall during a regular meeting, which are held every second Thursday at 7 p.m. Engelman also expressed gratitude to the business community for its continued and unwavering support.


"We have had an awesome response from the businesses," she said, adding the Elks had enough doors prizes during the bingo marathon to give a door prize to everyone who came out.


